      - Completed by participating contractor SitelQ
      - Common area project type
      - 352 total units
      - Upgraded common area lighting
      - Installed programmable pool and spa pumps
      - Installed timer on pool and spa heater
    - Energy savings information
      - Energy savings/97,000+kWh

- Breakdown of savings by measure
  - Upgraded common area lighting/84,338 kWh savings

  - Installed timer on pool and spa heater/110 therm savings
- Questions?
  - Minh Le (County of Los Angeles) asked how SoCalREN can increase our services to DACs?
    - Paul Kyllo (ICF) responded that the target for 2020 DACs was 60% (10% higher than 2019) and ICF is currently looking to expand outreach in 2021 by utilizing SoCalREN's regional partners to provide services to hard to reach customers
  - Minh Le mentioned that COVID-19 has impacted DACs the most and SoCalREN needs increase our presence in these communities to help renters, MF property owners and the overall community
- o Public Sector Programs (Rebecca Hausheer, TEC)
  - City of Costa Mesa, Orange County
    - Enrolled November 2016
    - Population 113,000+
    - 60% DAC classified
    - Agency participated in Project Delivery Program, Pathway to Zero, and Benchmarking Call to Action
  - Four completed projects
    - City-wide safety lights
    - Police station exterior lighting
    - Parks lighting (5)
    - Various exterior lighting
  - Three additional projects in progress
    - City Hall whole building
    - City Hall parking lot solar carport
  - Turnkey services leveraged
    - Project identification
    - Audit
    - Financing
    - Design & procurement
    - Construction



- Project closeout
- City Hall project impacts
  - Lifetime cost savings/\$3.6M
  - Reduction in energy consumption/37%
  - Annual savings/1M kWh
  - 154 cars off the road
- Total projects' impacts
  - \$392,000+ in financing and funding
  - \$7.5M in lifetime cost savings
  - 191 cars off the road
  - 885 metric tons CO2 GHG emissions avoided
  - 1.3M kWh annual energy savings

    - Rebecca Hausheer (TEC) replied it was a 14 year payback
  - Laurel Rothschild (TEC) asked how SoCalREN got the City to say yes
    - Rebecca replied that NPV was used to show the financial benefit to the city

        - Continuous education units available
        - Pathways include: Building Analyst, Energy Auditor and Project Manager
